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
Good News!

The National Survey of Student Engagement (NSSE) surveys freshmen and seniors every four years. The new data shows that UD students score above the national mean on clarifying their values and ethics and on doing community service.

How much Impact Can \$5 Make?





1) Application engages the ethos of the Wendt Character Initiative;




Wendt Character Grant Reports

Book Discussion Groups

Faculty and staff discussed Excellent Sheep: the Miseducation of the American Elite and the Way to a Meaningful Life by William Deresiewicz and An Essential Guide to Interpersonal Communication by Quentin Schultze and Diane Badzinski.

Deresiewicz argues, "Colleges do nothing...to challenge the values of a society that equates virtue, dignity, and happiness with material success" (71), and says, "You can't accessorize your way to moral courage" (115). Our lively discussions explored the nature of college, the importance of helping students pursue purposeful lives as they build selves committed to truth.

The Schultze book challenged us to consider attitude, effort, and purpose in interpersonal relationships. The gentle wisdom this book offers provided a foretaste of Dr. Schultze's Character Lecture.
