At our March interdisciplinary conference, *Character and Place: How We Shape Home and Home Shapes Us*, we hosted 74 attendees from 22 institutions, representing 26 different disciplines. A majority were from the Midwest and a significant number of UD faculty and staff participated, but it also included people from as far away as Florida, New York, Oregon, Pennsylvania, and the Czech Republic.

Interdisciplinary Character Conference



Dr. Brian J. Walsh served as scholar-in-residence and delivered the conference keynote, the Wendt Character Lecture. He critically examined the crisis of home and its impact on character, arguing that the normalization of moral bankruptcy and rampant "homelessness" of spirit have caused widespread de-formation of character in America. He called for healing and wholeness through homecoming to God, and rejection of our "domicidal" and consumerist way of life.

The conference ended with a closing conversation with Dr. Walsh, facilitated by Dr. Christine Darr, assistant professor of Christian Ethics at UD.

I think he really hit on something by suggesting that we are all, in one way or another, looking for a home. You don't need to be homeless per se to be longing for a home.








A Note from the Director

Shoes and Stories



What is this place? What story is it telling? The **Shoes on the Danube Bank** in Budapest, Hungary, lies below Parliament, which houses the Ministry of Justice. This bronzed memorial honors the WWII Jews who were lined up, forced to remove their shoes, and then shot on the water's edge so that their bodies would float away.

What a sobering reminder that justice or injustice can be represented by a place. As the Wendt Character Scholars considered the role justice plays in being people of good character this year, we explored our theme, The Place of Justice, through many topics relating "to treating others fairly, respecting diversity, and practicing Christian love," — our definition of character justice.

Two of the Character Scholars' spring sessions stand out to me and include one led by Dr. Brian Hallstoos. He took us on his personal journey through family history. This journey uncovered the ways his family benefitted from governmental programs that discriminated against non-whites, encouraging land ownership and housing purchases. It was eye-opening and painful for him and for us. The next week five of our Scholars led us in a panel

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discussion on racism as they've experienced it in their lives and here at UD, and they answered questions from other scholars. The power of speaking and listening to individual stories permeated the room and challenged us all to do more of that.

These stories are intricately intertwined with the places we've inhabited. UD has an institutional story made up of individuals' stories. Sometimes we're pillars of good character, and sometimes we're moral failures. That's the human condition. Our stories teach us through our failures about the need to hold justice and love together and remind us that hope, too, is a reality when we listen and learn.
