The Dubuque Eagles' "Eyes on the Future" Committee consists of a group of Dubuque students dedicated to serving people in need. Local philanthropist Michael Duehr created this committee when he noticed that the Dubuque Eagles did not have a place for youth participants. The "Eyes on the Future" committee includes student-members from local middle schools, high schools, and colleges—including some UD students, like me.

The committee's main focus is to help people who are in desperate need. We sponsor Burger Nights at the Eagles Club, which raises funds to help groups like "Toys for Tots,"

D.A.R.E. programs, and homeless shelters. We also help serve meals at the rescue mission and food pantry, participate in "Make a Difference Day" in Dubuque, volunteer at the Dubuque Humane Society, and take part in many other service projects.

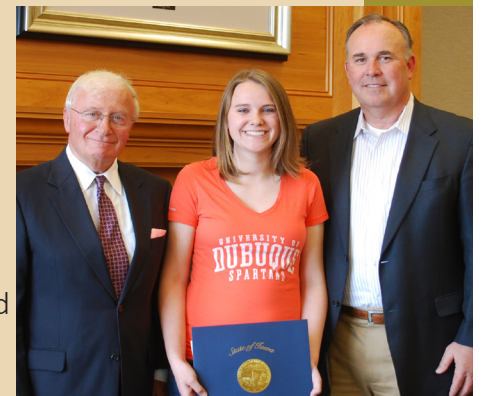
Our biggest event of the year is "Passion for Service Day." During this year's event, we volunteered at the Area Labor Harvest Food Giveaway, and then delivered food to six homeless shelters in Dubuque. Afterward, we helped a local church package more food that will be delivered to the homeless shelters, then finished the day raking leaves in the yards of community members who were unable to do it for themselves.

Members of the Eagles "Eyes on the Future" committee received two awards last year: one from the Governor of Iowa, Terry Branstad and the Lieutenant Governor, Kim Reynolds, and another presented by Senator Pam Jochum, President of the Iowa Senate. Both awards were in recognition of our dedication and commitment to service in Dubuque, and for helping those who are less fortunate in our community.

2015 J-TERMS TAKE ON HIV/AIDS & BULLYING

Last January, UD Mental Health Therapist for Student Support Services and Assistant Director of Programming for Advocacy and Prevention, Tabitha Bartelme, facilitated a J-term course focused on "HIV/AIDS Outreach & Education." The course reviewed the global problem and role that social, behavioral, and economic factors play in the spread of the epidemic. Students traveled to Los Angeles to engage in educational sessions with WRHAP (Whittier Rio Hondo Aids Project), whose mission is to minister to the needs of a community impacted by HIV/AIDS by providing support, understanding, and prevention programming.

Meanwhile, UD Director of Career & Life Services, Amy Baus, facilitated a course on the "Culture of Bullying." This course helped students understand bullying tactics and their psychological and social impacts. Students completed service-learning projects in collaboration with the Dubuque Community Schools' Green Dot Grant Program, which promotes positive social interactions among youth and identifies their social challenges. Trained UD students facilitated small group activities focused on bullying, kindness, and respect for over 200 youth.

We are looking forward to hearing Mr. Bhuiyan’s words on forgiveness and courageous compassion.

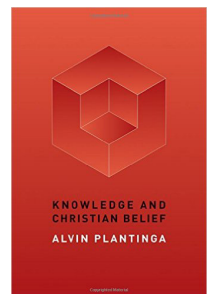

- Creating and sending major department-specific letters and individual candy-grams with notes of appreciation to all full-time UD/UDTS faculty members (Dr. Yartey's group).





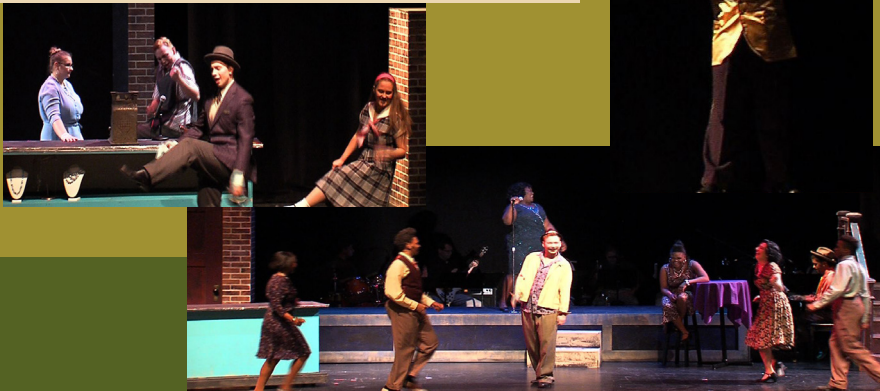

Gratitude by Patience McCarty

At the Wendt Character Initiative, we believe the journey to becoming excellent, character-filled persons begins with gratitude. Gratitude begets awareness, which calls for responsiveness, which manifests itself in acts of service.

So, what does “gratitude” mean? Merriam-Webster defines it as “a feeling of appreciation or thanks.” That’s a start. But I don’t think that quite covers it.

The more I focused on gratitude, the more grateful I became. And not only did my gratitude grow, but it became a wellspring for many other good things. . . Gratitude was seed for all the rest.

When I began as Administrative Assistant for the Wendt Center for Character Education last fall, I helped plan for Gratitude Week. I was impressed by the time and effort our scholars and faculty mentors put in to showing their appreciation for people who had impacted their lives. I even got a note of thanks from the scholars. Gratitude Week reminded me how good it feels to be appreciated. But, even more, I began to think about who I was grateful for. And the results were astounding.

I could name so many people who helped shape me—whether through specific actions, or simply through their loving presence. The longer I thought about it, the longer the list grew. I discovered something else, too: the more I focused on gratitude, the more grateful I became. And not only did my gratitude grow, but it became a wellspring for many other good things: joy, faithfulness, love, integrity, justice, compassion. Gratitude was seed for all the rest.

I believe that, when we see what we have, and when we are truly and humbly grateful for those gifts, we begin to understand how much we have to share. We begin to feel *integrity’s* pull—to realize our responsibility to be stewards of what we have been given. We begin to experience *compassion* for those who need what we have to share. We begin to feel a sense of *justice*, wanting the same good we experience to be shared by those in our family, our community, our world.

Gratitude is vital to living the Gospel message. Through gratitude, we love others; and through loving others, we love God. May we live this understanding in earnest, and may gratitude transform us as we seek to live lives of integrity, justice, and compassion.
