Welcome to the University of Dubuque! We're glad to have you as part of our campus community. This Quick Start Guide is designed to help you learn more about the University and its departments, services, culture, and history.

Right from the start, we want you to feel empowered to learn, and part of that is knowing about your campus and how it works. Think of this guide as your instruction manual for walking you through your first days and weeks as a Spartan. It is a handy reference to keep close by so that when you have a question, you know where to turn for a quick answer. While this guide may not contain everything you need to know about UD, it's a start to the basics and will get you on your way to operating smoothly!

In addition to these numbers, if you feel unsafe or are faced with an emergency, you can use one of the six emergency call boxes that are located around campus. The call boxes have blue lights on top and are labeled "Emergency." To use a call box, simply press the red button. The phone will automatically dial the Office of Safety and Security and they will immediately know your location. Please stay on the line to speak to an officer if possible.

The University of Dubuque uses the Spartan Alert Emergency System to inform students, faculty, and staff of Spartan Warnings or UD Alerts. A Spartan Warning is an event that has occurred on campus that posed no immediate risk to the campus community. A UD Alert is a situation that could pose an immediate health risk to the campus community (weather warnings, health warnings, active shooters, etc.). As a new student, you are automatically added to the Spartan Alert Emergency System. Alert notifications are sent via phone calls, emails, and text messages.

UD Student ID

Your student ID is an important tool that you will need throughout your time at UD. The University of Dubuque provides professional staff and faculty advisors to mentor and assist students with their course planning and academic success. Traditional first-year students attending UD directly out of high school and transfer students with less than 24 credits are assigned to a professional advisor within the Center for Advising. Toward the end of the student's first year, the student will be assigned to a faculty advisor. Transfer students with college experience outside of high school and 24 or more credits accepted to UD are directly assigned to a faculty advisor.

The Center for Advising offers support for Exploring students and assists with their exploration of major and career interests. The Center for Advising also offers academic coaching services and health professions advising. The academic success coach works with students who may be struggling academically. In meeting with the academic success coach, students can identify barriers that may be affecting their academic performance and work on strategies for improvement. The health professions advisor works with all UD undergraduate students interested in pursuing careers in healthcare.

The office is fully committed to maintaining a safe campus where students, faculty, and staff can live, work, and study in a secure and pleasant environment. Safety is a shared responsibility, and a truly safe campus can only be achieved through the cooperation, vigilance, and proactive attitudes of all students, faculty, and staff. The Office of Safety and Security encourages all University community members to take responsibility by reporting crimes, suspicious activity, accidents, abuse, harassing calls, unsafe conditions, or other emergencies immediately.

Since the opportunity for crime exists everywhere, they advise you to take precautions to avoid dangerous or risky situations. The following are safety and security tips:

- Use the "buddy" system when walking, especially after dark.
- Park vehicles and/or walk in well-lit areas.
- Use the Safety and Security escort service on campus, which is available 24 hours per day.
- Lock and double-check residence hall doors as well as vehicle doors and windows before leaving, even if only for a short time.
- Be sure to report lost keys, fobs, or ID cards immediately.
- Don't leave your possessions unattended.
- Don't leave large amounts of money in your room and keep valuables out of sight. If you can't keep your valuables with you, keep them locked
 in a drawer or closet.
- Make a list of your valuables and mark them, including books, with an ID that can help in their recovery. Record serial numbers of valuables such as gaming systems, stereos, computers, etc., and take photos, if possible.
- Report any broken or flickering lights, dimly lit corridors, broken locks/windows, or other items of concern.

- Physicals (well-women/men including pap smears, sports, and employment)
- Evaluation and treatment of acute illness or injury
- Chronic disease management (thyroid, asthma)
- On-site testing for strep, mononucleosis, influenza, blood sugar, urinalysis, pregnancy, and COVID-19

Students needing medical treatment after hours can obtain health services through Unity Point Urgent Care Clinics, Medical Associates Acute Care, or Emergency Departments.

Glossary

As you get acclimated to campus, you may hear some words and phrases that are new to you. Colleges and universities have their own unique jargon and lingo, and on top of that, each school has its own abbreviations and acronyms. It can take a while to figure it all out. Check this glossary for help!

Academic Advisor: an academic advisor is a faculty member or staff person on campus who will be assigned to work with you to provide guidance on academic matters such as course selection. Your academic advisor will assist you each semester as you register for classes, and they are also a great resource for other academic policy-related questions.

Academic Standing: to remain on good academic standing, students at UD must maintain a minimum grade point average (GPA) of 2.00. If a student falls below a 2.00, their standing will change to either academic alert, academic probation, or suspension.

Accredited/Accreditation: the official recognition that a college or university meets the standards of an external regional or national organization. Accreditation helps to ensure that students receive a quality education. The University of Dubuque is accredited by the Higher Learning Commission.

Add/Drop: a process that allows students to change their course schedules by adding or dropping courses. There is typically a period of time at the beginning of each semester when students may make these adjustments to their schedules themselves. After a certain number of days, changes to schedules will require signatures from professors and/or academic advisors.

Audit: to audit a course means to take it for the purpose of gaining knowledge about a subject, without receiving a grade or credit toward a degree.

Bachelor's Degree: a general term for a degree that requires 120+ specified credits, broken down into approximately four years of study. The University of Dubuque awards bachelor of arts, bachelor of science, and bachelor of business administration degrees.

Class Standing: first-year, sophomore, junior, or senior. Typically determined by the number of credits a student has earned. May or may not align with the number of years they have been enrolled. At UD, students are classified in the following way:

0-23.99 credit hours – first-year 24-57.99 credit hours – sophomore 58-89.99 credit hours – junior 90 or more credit hours – senior

Commencement: another word for graduation. At the University of Dubuque, commencement ceremonies are held in the winter and spring.

Course Catalog: sometimes referred to as academic catalog, undergraduate catalog, or just catalog. The course catalog is an online listing that contains a description of each major and course that is offered at the University of Dubuque. It also includes the academic calendar and academic policies.

Course Load: refers to the number of courses/credit hours a student takes during a specific semester.

Course Number: each course has an identification number that distinguishes it from other courses in a particular subject. Course numbers typically begin with letters indicating the subject. The numbers that follow the subject letters generally increase as the difficulty of the courses increase. Course numbers are organized in levels – 100-level, 200-level, and 300-level. For example, at UD, PSY 110 is an introductory psychology course and PSY 351 is a more specialized, higher level psychology course.

Discipline: another word for major. An area of academic study.

Electives: courses students can take for credit toward their degree, but are not part of the required course list for general education or their major or minor.

Exploring: being an Exploring student means that you have not yet selected a major.

Faculty: also called professors or instructors. The instructional staff of an educational institution.

FAFSA (Free Application for Federal Student Aid): the application used by the U.S. government to determine the amount of financial aid a student will receive in a given year. Students must reapply every year.

FERPA (Federal Education Rights and Privacy Act): a federal law which protects the privacy of student educational records.

Final Exams or Finals: an exam or assessment taken at the end of a semester or term. Typically cumulative, covering information from the entire course.

First-Generation: sometimes abbreviated first-gen. A first-generation college student is one whose parents did not earn a four-year degree. Sometimes the first member of their family to attend college.

Full-Time Student: at UD, the designation of full-time is used for students who are enrolled in 12 to 17 credit hours per semester.

General Education: sometimes abbreviated as gen eds, sometimes called core curriculum. General education is a set of courses required for all students at an institution, regardless of major. These courses are part of a traditional bachelor's degree program and are designed to teach diverse information and skills that all knowledgeable, educated citizens should have.

GPA (Grade Point Average): a system of recording a student's overall academic performance as a numerical average. GPA is on a 4.0 scale and is calculated at the end of each term/semester for that individual term/semester and cumulatively.

Handshake: an online resource with internship and employment resources updated weekly through the Office of Vocation, Career Services, and Community Engagement.

Major: your field of study. An area of specialization, consisting of a number of courses in a specific discipline.

Midterm: the middle or halfway point of an academic semester. Exams may be given at midterm, or grades may be given to indicate a student's progress so far in the course.

Minor: a secondary field of study or area of specialization.

Moodle: also referred to as UDOnline, this is an online course management tool that many of your professors will use for your classes. It typically contains resources such as the course calendars, assignments, syllabi, contact information, discussions, etc. You can find your Moodle course pages at moodle.dbg.edu.

MTWRF: abbreviations used, most often on your class schedule, to mean Monday, Tuesday, Wednesday, Thursday, Friday.

MyUD: your personal online account where you may review an unofficial transcript, financial information, grades, and your class schedule. It can be accessed at myv.dbg.edu.

Office Hours: designated times professors have selected to be available in their offices to provide help to students. Most professors post their office hours on their office door. You can also check your class syllabus to see when your professors are available.

Prerequisite: a required course that must be completed successfully before a student is permitted to enroll in a more advanced course.

Resident Assistant (RA): a trained peer leader who coordinates activities in residence halls. RAs build community through programming, serve as a mentor for the students who live on their wing or floor, and are a good resource for general questions about campus life.

Residence Hall Director (RHD): a professional staff person who lives in the residence hall with students. They are responsible for the management and daily operations of the hall and provide support for the students who live there.

Registration: the process during which students choose and enroll in courses for an academic term.

Semester: an academic term that lasts approximately 15 weeks.

Syllabus/Syllabi: a document distributed by professors at the beginning of each new course. Think of it like a class plan. Syllabi typically outline material a course will cover, class expectations, grading information, assignments, required textbooks for the course, and instructor contact information.

Transcript: an official document with a record of your attempted and completed courses and your grades. You may request your transcript from the Office of the Registrar or you can view an unofficial transcript online through MyUD.

Undergraduate: a post-secondary education program leading to a bachelor's degree. The term also refers to a student attending such a program.

Vault: an online future career resources library updated weekly by the Office of Vocation, Career Services, and Community Engagement.

Work Study: a type of part-time on-campus job that you may be eligible for through your federal financial aid award. There are many different job options across campus. For more information, visit the Office of Financial Planning.



Spartan History



Founded in 1852

The University of Dubuque was founded in 1852 by Rev. Adrian Van Vliet. His vision was to educate men who could minister to German-speaking





Alumni Common, formerly known as the Quad

In the early 1900s, the buildings that surround the Quad were developed. The William C. Laube Memorial Bell Tower, constructed in 1975, honored William C. Laube, PhD, a University of Dubuque Theological Seminary professor, and his wife, Lydia Arns Laube. In summer 2018, the bell tower was disassembled as part of a renovation to the Quad that was completed fall 2018.

First Women Admitted

Women were admitted to the school in 1912. Of the first five female students, Frieda Grieder was the only one to enter the college that year. The other four women were enrolled in college preparatory classes in the academy and entered college the following academic year.

In the early 1930s, the UD sports teams known as "Blue and White" gained the name Spartans – for engaging in struggles but never surrendering.


