
Co-Curricular Study Guide

CO-CURRICULAR STUDY GUIDE

The following is a recommended guide for adding a valuable dimension to a student's education within and outside the classroom. Please do not feel limited to these suggestions, but use them as a starting point when developing your own co-curricular plan.

Increase Depth of Knowledge

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- Attend the Academic Success Center (ASC) tutoring sessions for your classes regarding content review and learning strategies.
- Participate in peer led discussions for your classes.
- Utilize online resources from the Career Services web site to explore careers for your major.
- With your Faculty Advisor and Career Services, plan an internship within your academic major.
- Join an on-campus student organization or honor society within your major.
- Join an off-campus club/organization within your field of interest.
- Utilize UD's on-line career research tools and resources to learn of career opportunities within the academic major.
- Discuss with your Faculty Advisor the purpose of higher education within a liberal arts institution when working on your degree plan.
- Attend Career Services' events and workshops.

Write Clearly, Read with Comprehension, Speak Effectively

- Utilize UD Writing Center.
- Participate in student publications on-campus.
- Participate in the Student Government Association.
- Participate in the University Program Council.
- Become a tutor in the Academic Success Center.

Understand the University's Mission and Vision

- Become involved in student organizations oncampus.
- Participate in Student Life activities/events that are guided by tradition, academic excellence, diversity, community, stewardship, lifelong learning, and service.
- Participate in events/programs supported by the Wendt Initiative and the Office of Service and Leadership.

Gain Hands on Experiences

- Participate in Study Abroad and International Education programs.
- Attend career fairs.
- Participate in an internship.
- Participate in a service learning and/or volunteer opportunity through the Office of Service and Leadership.
- Become a Residence Hall Assistant.
- Participate in Job Shadows and Employer Site Visits supported by courses within the academic major.

Develop Awareness and Respect for Diversity

- Attend Life Services' annual programs.
- Work with International Studies to hold campus-wide discussions on UD diversity and awareness.
- Attend educational programs to help students learn about peers with disabilities.
- Become an Academic Success Center leader, tutor, or presenter and learn to teach others about learning styles and diverse approaches to study.
- Support and attend programs for UD commuter, 1st generation, and non-traditional students.
- Learn another language and culture while studying abroad.
- Become a member of the Black Student Union (BSU), International Friendship Club (IFC), Organization of Latin American Students (OLAS), Residence Hall Association (RHA), and/or University Program Council (UPC).
- Participate in hall workshops on how to live with others who are different than you.
- Assist the Office of Student Activities to plan and present Diversity Week Activities.
- Attend Diverse Leadership Conferences.

Value and Recognize Ethical Perspectives and Moral Purpose

- Serve on the Judicial Council and learn community governance and mediation skills.
- Support and attend workshops that promote ethics and honesty through the Office of Service and Leadership.
- Participate in the annual Wendt Conference.
- Become a Wendt Character Scholar on the UD Campus.
- Challenge and/or confirm your values and perspectives while studying abroad.
- Participate in Chapel Services, discussion groups, and biblical study through Campus Ministry and the Campus Chaplain.

Actively Participate in Community Service

- Join a student services organization such as; Boys and Girls Club, Big Brothers/Big Sisters, Dubuque Regional Humane Society, Hope House, St. Mark's Community Center, Hills and Dales, Bethany Home, and Camp Albrecht Acres.
- Serve as an officer on Student Government Association.
- Assist Residence Life with their community projects.
- Participate in Service Projects through the Office of Service and Leadership.
- Volunteer in your hometown community during winter/ summer breaks.

Grow Cultural, Intellectual, and Spiritual Growth

- Attend UD Cultural Events; plays, choir concerts, art exhibits, and photography exhibits.
- Attend Study Abroad Informational Sessions/Fair.
- Support and assist in the planning of Campus Ministry programming/events.
- Attend the Senior Thesis Exhibit.
- Develop and attend debates, panels, and programs hosted by student clubs/organizations.
- Support discussions within World View I and World View II courses on how new learning impacts current faith system, personal traditions/views, and how to assimilate information.
